She began to share her passion with friends, society ladies who would dress in fine frocks and bonnets to join her. The year was 1840 and the English Afternoon Tea was born.

Tickton Grange shares the same Georgian heritage with Anna. Set in the East Yorkshire countryside, its reputation for Afternoon Tea is second to none.

Every effort is taken to ensure that your afternoon tea reaches you in perfect condition. Please refrigerate at or below 5°C and consume within 24 hours of delivery.

Scones and sausage rolls are best eaten warm. Simply place on a tray and bake at 160°C for 3 minutes for the scones or until warm throughout and, for the sausage rolls, 5-8 minutes or until hot throughout.

succulent pork from East Riding farms
contains gluten/eggs/dairy

Swaledale Cheese Bites
iconic cheese from the Yorkshire Dales
contain egg/dairy/gluten

Smoked Trout Tartlet
fish from local ponds, artisan smoked in a neighbouring village
contains egg/dairy/gluten

Sandwich Fingers
East Yorkshire ham, ale mustard
Glasshouse cucumber, Yorkshire cream cheese
Staal smoked salmon, lemon and black pepper
contain gluten/dairy/sulphites/mustard
